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Introducing Tasha Everman, Our New Board President!

Pear Members of the Lincoln Literacy Community.

I had the opportunity to meet many of you at the Open House last month, but if we have not yet had the opportunity to meet, I sincerely hope we can rectify that soon. In the meantime, allow me to introduce myself as Lincoln Literacy's new board president. It is with immense honor and excitement that I take on this role, and I am eager to contribute to the remarkable work being done by this organization.

My connection to Lincoln Literacy is not new. Over 30 years ago, my journey began as I taught English as a Second Language (ESL) to Indo-Chinese refugees at the Phanat Nikhom Refugee Processing Center in Thailand.

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Lincoln Literacy recently expanded its computer literacy offerings, creating three classes that each meet twice a week. As a result, enrollment has jumped significantly from the spring semester.

Ukrainian Services Coordinator Nataliia Bohuta is one of the teachers, and she said that merging computer skills and English-language learning has enabled students to improve in both areas.

Jayanta and Sarmistha Chakraborty have a computer at home, but only recently have they made good use of it.

The couple, from Mumbai, India, took a computer literacy course this summer at Lincoln Literacy.

"In class, the teacher is very disciplined. In our house we have an iMac but we are diverted," Sarmistha Chakraborty said. "They are teaching us the basics; what is hard disk, what is monitor, what is click."

Another student, Taina Castillon, immigrated from Haiti three months ago. "I really like the computer class," she said.

After just a few classes she created a 14slide PowerPoint presentation about healthy foods that included text, photos, and a variety of transitions between slides.

The class not only makes students more job-ready but also helps them feel more connected to their new community.

"The teachers are very nice and I have learned many things," Jayanta Chakraborty said.

It was a question Ellie Akough didn't expect.

The Lincoln Literacy spring intern was working with a five-year old who had previously been very tight-lipped, but the little girl's curiosity was too great, so she looked up at Akough and asked, "Why are you so big?"

Akough, who grew up in Elkhorn, is taller and stronger than the average tutor, with abilities she put to use becoming a three-time state champion discus and shot put thrower in high school. She likely would have added to that total but the Covid-19 pandemic cancelled her senior season.

Akough, 20, earned a track scholarship at Oregon — one of sport's elite institutions — but Akough said being an athlete was more like a job.

"I didn't feel like there was anyone in my corner," Akough said. "I didn't have any mentors, and with Covid, I couldn't connect with my professors. I was able to make friends and focus more on school, and it was hard to be at a school that didn't prioritize that."

Akough transferred to Nebraska Wesleyan last summer, and though the facilities and the level of competition were a step down, she fell in love with the campus and her professors.

And she's still very good at hurling large objects a long distance. At the Division III National Championship Meet in May, Akough finished fourth in the discus and eighth in the hammer throw, earning her All-American honors in each event.

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On June 29, over 200 people gathered to celebrate the Open House for Lincoln Literacy's new building at 1023 Lincoln Mall. Tom Beckius from the City Council, Board Chair Tasha Everman, Capital Campaign Chair Janet Eskridge, former student Isai Gonzalez, and Jennifer Cintani from the Cintani Family Foundation all shared remarks to the gathered crowd of tutors, students, staff, current and former board members, elected officials, and community members.

Tom Beckius spoke about the City's support of newcomers and its \$700,000 ARPA grant to Lincoln Literacy that kickstarted our campaign. This allowed us to purchase the building, begin renovations, and establish a maintenance reserve.

Isai Gonzalez shared his inspiring story of coming to Lincoln without knowing English and learning through our classes. He went on to earn a computing degree from Southeast Community College and is now an IT professional for the Nebraska Department of Labor.

Jennifer spoke about her family's long-time commitment to Lincoln Literacy and to helping our newest neighbors learn English, find employment and connect to their community. After the speakers, attendees visited the building's first and second floors. The new building provides improved office space for staff and four classrooms to serve our students — all in the same neighborhood where many of our students live.

She also excelled in the classroom where she finished her degree in gender studies in just three years.

"I wish I didn't speed through my degree; I wish I had another year there," Akough said. Her internship with Lincoln Literacy has ended but her time as a tutor has not.

Akough continued to teach an online class this summer while she pondered her career future.



Working within The Consortium, a U.S. State Department-funded program, my primary focus was on teaching Lao, Khmer, Mien and Hmong students who were soon to be resettled in the United States. After six total years of teaching ESL in Thailand and Taiwan, I returned to Lincoln to pursue a law degree.

It was during this period that I first became a tutor with Lincoln Literacy for one hour per week. A year later, I joined the board and had the privilege of being part of the hiring committee that selected Clay Naff to lead Lincoln Literacy forward. The growth that Clay oversaw as Executive Director is truly remarkable. He assembled a talented team and led them with passion, intelligence, and empathy.

Last fall, after Clay's retirement was announced, I once again had the honor of serving on the hiring committee for Executive Director, this time with the seemingly impossible task of finding a candidate who could fill Clay's shoes. Miraculously, Bryan Seck emerged, and Lincoln Literacy's upward trajectory has not skipped a beat! I look forward to the coming years of collaboration.
