

Example of a Lesson Plan for Advanced Level

1. Greeting
2. Go over homework (if any)
- 3. Pronunciation Practice**

Use your student's special interest to choose an appropriate level reading selection from an Advanced ELL Workbook. If you want, you can check books out from Lincoln Literacy's library.

- Prepare with new vocabulary (5-7 new words)
- Exercises in comprehension (in book)
- Discussion questions (in book)
- Exercise in writing

4. Assign homework. It can be assigned from unfinished worksheets.

Activity 1:
Pronunciation

Materials:

- Minimal Pairs worksheet
- Whiteboard/dry erase markers

Time:
Whatever seems reasonable

Activity 2:
Reading selection

Materials:
Worksheet or Book

Time:
When lesson time is over.

Pronunciation with Minimal Pairs

Minimal pairs are two words that have the same pronunciation except for one sound. Practicing minimal pairs is helpful when similar sounds are too similar for a non-native English speaker to pronounce correctly.

Have a list of words focusing on a target sound. Tutor says a word first, then the student repeats.

You can also practice with these **minimal pairs**.

pig – peg	sip - zip	cut - cat
lid - lead	writer - rider	pin - bin
ship - sheep	pen - pan	tent - tenth
itch - each	tease - knees	sheer - cheer
lot - not	tie - lie	bowling - boring
flight - fight	arrive - alive	kneel - near
lit – let	grow - glow	hard - heart
pat - bat	sigh - thigh	bent - vent
