A YEAR OF CONTINUITY AND CHANGE

Refugee resettlement and fresh immigration may have stalled, but refugees and immigrants remain a vital part of our community. In 2018 we continued to offer dozens of free English language classes and literacy tutoring sessions throughout the week at locations all over the city, along with our FLAIR classes for kids. But, in response to emerging community needs, we also introduced many innovative new approaches and services. Here we highlight a few.

CNA Prep Class: Bridging the Skills Gap

Responding to the needs of our adult learners and our community, Lincoln Literacy has initiated s CNA prep class. With generous funding from the Community Health Endowment and in collaboration with Bryan Health and its College of Health Sciences, we have jointly enrolled refugees, asylees, and immigrants to help them become certified nursing assistants. The first six completed our prep program in 2018 and went on to enroll in Bryan College's accredited class to become certified nursing aides.

Adult Empowerment Programs

During 2018, we restructured and expanded our adult literacy offerings. With the hiring of Renee Cox, MSW, we launched new GED prep classes and laid plans to offer other skill-building opportunities to English speakers and English learners alike.

Blended Learning and the Challenge of Digital Literacy

Opportunities to learn online are exploding, but a person can only take advantage if they have access and know how to make use of it. We introduced technology into our classes at every level, and pointed the way to safe use.

Student Story

How can a woman who never had the chance to go to school consider herself lucky? Khani Sharo does. She and her husband Naif are among the fortunate few Yezidis who not only escaped the genocidal attacks of ISIS but were accepted as refugees into the United States. Since arriving in 2016, they've made good use of their time since — especially Khani. Attending our classes at Belmont Elementary, held as part of an LPS family literacy program there, she blossomed.

In just four months, she learned two years' worth of English, and went on to win the Mayor's Award for Language and Literacy Achievement.

"I didn't know anything," Khani said. "I didn't even know how to write my own name." In accepting the award, Khani was able to read from a hand-written statement that she composed to thank her teachers. Quite an achievement.

Tutor Story

When we launched our CNA prep class, we never imagined we'd have experts at the helm. We thought we would have to rely heavily on textbooks and online resources. But to our astonishment, we launched class with a volunteer tutor crew consisting of a physician, a nurse, and a CNA. Mike Eppel, Cindy Sandeen, and Sarah Rogalla have since been joined by other medical professionals in this remarkable class.

Mike Eppel continues to lead the way. Doctors are notoriously busy, but the gastroenterologist started volunteering at Lincoln Literacy in 2007, when he was still working full-time in his practice. He's continued to tutor ever since, and has used some of his vacations to provide medical assistance in Haiti and most recently to Ryohinga refugees in Burma. He also serves on the Lincoln Literacy board.




COMMUNITY PARTNERS

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

2018 Income By Source


